



Anti-Bullying Policy

This policy applies to the whole school community, students and staff. Everyone has the right to work and study in an environment free from bullying.

Bullying will not be accepted or condoned, and all forms of this will be addressed.

The Law

Some forms of bullying are illegal and should be [reported to the police](#). These include:

- Violence or assault
- theft
- repeated harassment or intimidation, for example name calling, threats and abusive phone calls, emails or text messages
- hate crimes

Call 999 if you or someone else is in immediate danger.

What is Bullying?

The Anti-Bullying Alliance defines bullying as:

‘The repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. Bullying can be physical, verbal or psychological. It can happen face-to-face or through cyberspace’

It can happen anywhere, including school, the street, on the internet, even at home and can happen to anyone.

Bullying can take many forms, but the main types of bullying are:

- Physical (e.g. hitting, kicking, pushing, pinching, groping, theft of personal belongings)
- Verbal (e.g. name calling, taunting, mocking, racist remarks, sexist remarks)
- Indirect (e.g. spreading rumours, excluding people from groups)
- Cyber bullying (e.g. bullying by mobile phone or through the internet)

Other types of bullying are:

Sexual bullying – can have the following characteristics:

- Sexual innuendoes and propositions
- Abusive name-calling
- Looks and comments about appearance, attractiveness (e.g. emerging puberty)
- Pornographic material, graffiti with sexual content
- In its most extreme form, sexual assault or rape.

Homophobia and bullying against the LGBTQ+ community - We should be alert to sexual bullying based around sexual orientation, whether or not the person being bullied is lesbian, gay, bi-sexual or transgender. Generally, this type of bullying looks like other sorts of bullying,

but in particular it can include: Verbal abuse - including spreading rumours that someone is gay, suggesting that something or someone is inferior and so they are 'gay'- e.g. 'those trainers are so gay!'

Prejudice-based bullying: is any type of direct physical or verbal bullying, indirect bullying or cyberbullying based on relevant protected characteristics (race or national/ethnic origin, gender, disability, religion or belief, sexual orientation, gender reassignment, age or pregnancy/maternity).

Everybody has the responsibility to work together to stop bullying. This includes parents and guardians, the whole school community – students, staff, and Trustees.

There is a commitment to the early identification of bullying and prompt, collective action to deal with it.

The complaints procedure in school

If a student is being bullied, the following procedures should be followed:

- The child will be encouraged to talk to a member of staff. The staff member will listen to the child and assure them that they will be safe after 'telling'. Staff will record everything that has happened.
- Parents/carers of the child will be contacted to discuss the child's concerns and actions being taken.
- The child will be checked regularly to see if things have improved. Any further incidents will be recorded and actioned appropriately.
- Parents/carers are able to make a formal complaint if they are not happy with the school's procedures with dealing with the bullying. The complaint should be made to Values Academy Board of Trustees. They will then investigate how the concern has been handled. Refer to Values Academy Complaints Policy for more information about how to do this.

Support to the bullied

Unconditional support will be given to all who perceive themselves as bullied, and everyone should be clear who will listen to and support them.

Children/young people should have access to helpline numbers.

Those reporting bullying should be told what is being recorded, in what context and why.

Anyone who reports an incident of bullying will be listened to carefully and be supported, whether it is the person being bullied or the person who is bullying.

Any reported incident of bullying will be investigated objectively and will involve listening carefully to all those involved.

A register of reported incidents and actions taken, including follow up meetings will be maintained and kept in the office.

Those who bully will be supported and encouraged to stop bullying. This will be through whole school and targeted Values sessions, PD sessions, and through a multi-agency approach when necessary.

Parents/carers will be informed of policies and procedures in relation to bullying.

Any incident of bullying will be discussed with parents/carers of the bullied and bully. In the case of staff being bullied, discussions will be as appropriate. If staff are accused of bullying colleagues or students, procedures detailed in the Safeguarding Policy will be followed
